### **ABOUT WEST'S DRUG AND ALCOHOL STUDIES PROGRAM**

In Spring 2001, Psychology 64 was introduced and marked the beginning of our program. Psychology 65 began in Fall 2002. We will be adding courses yearly until we are able to offer a complete 36 unit two-to-three year certificate program with an AA option that will prepare students with all necessary coursework and will qualify them to take the written exam offered by the California Certification Board of Drug and Alcohol Counselors (CAADE). All courses are approved by CAADE and accredited. Our proposed complete program has also been approved by CAADE. If the West student should complete our existing courses, he or she can simply continue at another college such as Los Angeles City College and finish the coursework not yet offered at West. Most of the Drug and Alcohol courses may be

used as an elective course for an AA degree in Psychology and some are General Education AA electives.

### **PSYCHOLOGY 64 - INTRODUCTION TO DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE (CSU) - 3 UNITS**

Note: This class is offered during the day in the Fall semester and evening in the

Spring semester.

This course is an introduction to the physiology and psychopharmacology of drugs and alcohol, theories of addiction, a historical overview of treatment, drug classifications, social policy and drug abuse, and issues of relapse, rehabilitation and recovery.
